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
A long and intense school year has ended. It began with the birth of a new degree program, Musical Theatre, at the same time the second year of the Bolonia degree programs, defined by the new Plan of Studies, reached their equator. Despite the difficulties and changes enforced by the rapid implantation of these changes, our school has brilliantly shown once more that between classes, workshops, and final projects we are capable of premiering no fewer than 45 plays. The final projects this year were especially notable: Terminal, Meeting, Eat a Bite, Totum Revolutum or The Wall. They are clear examples of organization and teamwork, excellently piloted by their tutors. High level artists and officials from different places have visited: from José Carlos Plaza to Peter Sellars (to only name two). The number of bilateral agreements signed with diverse public and private institutions has also multiplied: currently more than 35 schools in 17 countries of the European Union. The Department for Advancement and Artistic Development has a growing need for support. Together with the Piccoolo Teatro in Milan and the ISADAC school in Rabat, the Jose Estruch Association has piloted the Samira project. All of these initiatives would be impossible without the involvement of the entire scholastic community, from the administrative staff and services, professors and students. Thank you all for your efforts.

Our intention is to continue fomenting the collaboration in different areas. In a world in which global communication is ever easier, huge cultural barriers remain which inhibit easy exchange within our artistic disciplines. In this same way the three different governmental administrations in Madrid need to achieve the integration of the arts, combining forces an inevitable transversal collaboration in the face of the deepening economic crisis.

The Final Project Workshops

The Final Project Workshops for the 2011-12 course year were performed at the RESAD between May 28th and July 6th. Five different workshops were shown in the two school's two theaters. The first was *Eat a Bite*, a black comedy revolving around the need for evil to exist in today's society as shown by a masters degree for criminals. *Totum Revolutum* followed, a musical comedy that revisits the French Revolution. *Meeting* a dramatic comedy about the use of technology and virtual reality as substitutes for the real world, and *The Wall*, a tragic-comedy stemming from the work of Pink Floyd about turn of the century Europe.

Fourth year students with majors in Stage Direction, Dramatic Writing, Scenography, Physical and Spoken theater worked with the professors Andrés del Bosque, Ernesto Caballero, Miguel Ángel Camacho, José Cruz, Mariano Gracia, José Luis Raymond and Nacho Sevilla.

The following conferences, colloquials and roundtable discussions took place in the RESAD:

Spanish Theatre Studies in Germany, a talk given by S. Schreckenberg, was organized by the Theatre Sciences and Writing Department, who also organized The Difficulties of Interpreting Classical Texts by A. Querejeta. Three Indispensable Voices, brought together authors J. L. Alonso de Santos, J. Sanchis Sinisterra and F. Cabal, with interventions by Ángel Martínez Roger and Margarita Piñero. The lecture, Acting in Music Theatre, was given by D. Rodríguez and organized by the area of Singing Applied to the Dramatic Arts. C. Moya discussed Flamenco for Actors, an open class organized by the Department of Movement. The Department for Advancement and International Relations organized a Festival for Community Theatre and Theatre in a Time of Fracturing Society, with E. Casanova, D. Ojeda, F. Barta and H. Cruz, J. Amich moderated. The Acting Department organized A Meeting on Theatre Texts with JC Plaza.

Financed by AECID and in collaboration with the Piccolo Teatro in Milan, the corporative theatrical project Samira... (2011-2012) has been developed between Morocco, Spain and Italy with the following premise: to work on a creative process with shared responsabilities between the three; expand horizons through working with professionals from other countries: select a theme the Moroccan students could relate to without systematically avoiding potentially conflictive topics —western theatre would not exist without conflict—; produce an entertaining show as a result of the ethical goals; expose western historical errors and prejudice about the "Moors", and investigate the prejudices and measures the Arab world sometimes puts before any other assessment in their relations with the western world; to make our workshop a space for dialogue and debate about all these topics only to take them public afterwards. In May 2012 we happily concluded.

From May 24th thru 26th the RESAD was full of international activities. The presentation of "Samira..." (a project organized on three fronts by the Piccolo Teatro, the R.E.S.A.D. I.S.A.D.A.C. of Marruecos) coincided with the last meeting of the network of European theatre schools École des Écoles. Two new schools, from Switzerland and Norway, also joined the organization for the first time. During the work sessions, Sverre Doal (Denmark), was again elected president of the organization. Current and future activities for the next two years were outlined, mainly oriented towards meetings between professors from the different schools and the members of EdE integrated in the European Seminar Grundtvia (lead by the RESAD/Estruch between 2010 and 2012), part of the sessions was dedicated to evaluating what was learned and how the project was managed, and finalizing the process for the general report presentation and assigning different parts to the different countries. The debate following the performance of "Samira..." was perhaps the most enriching moment, the inter-cultural and mixed nature of the project has much in common with the trajectory of the EdE itself. Different areas of the School hosted the Moroccan actors and actresses, Italian, Moroccan and French directors, professors and professionals from Norway, France, Italy, Denmark, Spain, Switzerland, Great Britain, Brussels, and Germany...a great pleasure supported by everyone's hard work which we would like to thank.

Book Night

At the same time in the lobby of the RESAD there was a Theater Book Fair, with book stores and publishers: ADE, Antígona, Caos, La Celestina and Fundamentos showed their catalogues and books for sale.
